#### **OUR HISTORY**

Davis House Child Advocacy Center was formed in March 1999 under the leadership of Ronald L. Davis, District Attorney General for the 21st Judicial District, and was originally The Williamson County Child Advocacy Center Task Force. It later became known as Davis House Child Advocacy Center and officially opened its doors in September 2000.

The Center was designed to provide a safe, child-friendly place for children to come following allegations of abuse and where they, and their non-offending caregivers, could receive services to help them through the healing process. Davis House was developed according to National Children's Alliance guidelines, which are considered best practices for Child Advocacy Centers across the country. In October of 2010, Davis House became a fully-accredited member of the National Children's Alliance, and has maintained "Accredited Member" status ever since.

In the years since Davis House first opened its doors, services have continually expanded as caseloads have increased. In 2006, a second center location was opened in Hohenwald (Lewis County) to enable clients in that area to more easily access services. In addition, a third facility was opened in Centerville (Hickman County) in 2016.

#### **OUR MISSION**

To provide investigative, advocacy, family support, and therapeutic services to children who have experienced sexual or significant physical abuse or some other traumatic event, as well as trauma-informed community education, designed to guide our towns and civic spaces to be safer and more resilient for everyone. Child abuse does not just affect the child. Once disclosure is made, the entire family is in crisis. Our dual goal: to treat the child and the family as they heal from the trauma of abuse; and to educate caregivers, collaborative partners, and all adults in the community, in order to better protect everyone.

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







#### **OUR IMPACT**

The mission of Davis House Child Advocacy Center is to combat child abuse by coordinating services to children and their families in crisis and providing community outreach and prevention education to children and adults. We offer a variety of training options, including:

The 411 of Child Abuse is a sexual abuse and physical abuse prevention training. This training takes a deep dive into reporting in the state of Tennessee, as well as covering local and national statistics about abuse. It is a 45-minute to 1.5-hour facilitator-led training which includes a PowerPoint presentation. This training is TrainTN (TNPAL) approved for childcare facilities.

Darkness to Light's **Stewards of Children** is a comprehensive sexual abuse prevention training program that educates adults on how to prevent, recognize, and react responsibly to child sexual abuse. It is a 2.5-3-hour training. This facilitator led training includes videos, workbooks, and discussion segments to help individuals with multiple learning styles. This training is NASW approved and TrainTN (TNPAL)approved for childcare facilities.

Monique Burr Foundation's **Child Safety Matters** and **Teen Safety Matters** are comprehensive, evidence-based prevention programs that cover child abuse, bullying, and internet safety. These trainings consist of two 60-minute facilitator led lessons that can be broken down into four 30-minute sessions to better fit time constraints. Each lesson includes videos, interactive discussions, and safety rules that are age and developmentally appropriate. This program satisfies the legislative requirements of "Erin's Law".

The **Nurturing Parenting Programs** are a family-centered, trauma-informed initiative designed to build nurturing parenting skills as an alternative to abusive and neglecting parenting and child-rearing practices. This program includes twelve parenting lessons to help reduce rates of recidivism of abuse and teaching positive parenting behaviors. The twelve-lesson program can be broken into either 12, 6, or 4 sessions to best serve your group.

We also offer customized training based on the specific needs of an organization. We have partnered with organizations, such as the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the Mama Bear Effect, to provide our community with resources on safe internet use for children and teens, as well as how to talk to your children about sex and body safety.

Reach out to see what Davis House can offer you! **All** training and presentations are delivered at <u>no cost</u>.

Between July 2022 to June 2023, the Davis House Prevention team trained 2,366 adults and children. 529 students between kindergarten and 12th grade were taught age-appropriate lessons on body safety, internet safety, healthy relationships, consent, and safe adults. 1,837 adults were taught how to recognize signs of abuse, how to react responsibly if a child discloses abuse, and how to report abuse.

Our goal is to provide education to our community so that we can make it a safer place for the children to grow up happy, healthy, and with their boundaries intact.

#### **DEPARTMENT REPORTS**

#### CHILD & FAMILY ADVOCACY

The Child and Family Advocate (CFA) provides a variety of services to the children we serve, as well as their nonoffending parent(s) or caregiver(s). The CFA serves as the point person to shepherd the family through the entire process and helps link them to the services they need, whether those services are provided by Davis House staff or a community partner. The CFA works with the child and family as long as is necessary (including the trial process), or until services are no longer desired by the family.

#### FORENSIC INTERVIEWING

Children under the age of 18 who have potentially experienced sexual or significant physical abuse, or other forms of traumatic events, first come to Davis House for a forensic interview, which is a conversation designed to hear what happened from the child's perspective, in the child's voice, in a non-leading, non-suggestive manner.

Conducting the interviews at Davis House ensures a child experiences a friendly, neutral setting. The forensic interviewers are trained to conduct a thorough interview with as little further trauma to the child as possible. This interview with the child is recorded to help minimize the number of times the child has to tell their story. If needed at a later time, the organizations directly involved in the investigation (members of the Child Protective Investigative Team only) are able to watch the recording rather than re-interview the child. This also helps greatly reduce further trauma to the child.

#### TRAUMA-FOCUSED THERAPY

The trauma-focused therapy program provides mental health treatment to children and adolescents following sexual abuse, significant physical abuse, or other traumatic event. Davis House employs Clinical Therapists who are highly trained in evidence based, trauma-informed treatment modalities. At the beginning of treatment, the clinical therapist develops a specialized treatment plan for each child based on their individual needs. Throughout treatment, the therapist meets with the child and their family in order to reassess and review goals to ensure the best level of therapeutic support is provided.

Children receiving therapy services are given the appropriate amount of time to complete their treatment plan. However, children are always welcome to return to resume treatment should additional support be needed at a later time.

#### ONE FAMILY'S STORY

"When they knocked on the door this time, I knew it was going to be different. I lived with my dad, two brothers, and grandparents. The house was filled with bugs, and they were crawling everywhere. This was normal to me, but I could tell by the look on the CPS lady's face that it was not normal to her. She and two police officers talked to me outside, but I was scared about what would happen. I was scared to say anything. She asked me if anyone, specifically my grandfather, had ever touched me. The answer was yes, but I couldn't tell her.

I was taken to the Davis House a few days later and talked with a nice lady. She made me feel safe, and I was able to talk about what happened. I remember choosing a button and getting a stuffed animal before I left. I sleep with this stuffed animal every night and it reminds me of how brave I was to share my story."
